"Instrument Assisted Soft Tissue Mobilization"

Friday, Nov. 6 from 5 to 8 p.m., and the program continues on Saturday, Nov. 7 from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

The two-day workshop is led by Dr. Mark Butler, a physical therapist.

A soft-tissue injury involves damage to the muscles, ligaments, tendons and/or myofascial (skeletal muscle.) Sprains and strains are the most common soft-tissue injuries and are the result of either a trauma, such as falling, or repetitive use.

The fingers alone can't treat the full range of soft tissue restrictions and handheld tools have been developed to assist with soft-tissue mobilization.

This course covers the theory and intervention strategies for identifying and treating soft tissue restrictions utilizing Instrument Assisted Soft Tissue Mobilization (IASTM) techniques.
